Plant-Based Cooking

On the 21st May, seventeen of us arrived with anticipation at Lucy and Clive Austin's home for a demonstration and tasting of Lucy's delicious cooking. Lucy's aim was to show people that plant-based cooking can be delicious and nutritious; and to encourage people to try it occasionally as a healthy and environmentally-friendly alternative to meat and dairy-based meals.





Everyone was greeted on arrival with a selection of drinks and starters. There were bowls of *faux* gras (an alternative to foie gras), stuffed mushrooms and an 'egg' sandwich filling, along with a selection of crackers. These started the conversations off immediately and everyone became enthused and excited about what else was coming.

Then we all sat down to watch Lucy demonstrate making a Bolognese sauce, tomato dahl, a cheese sauce, a romesco sauce and beetroot and sweet potato burgers. It was amazing how she managed to keep on track with all those recipes while answering questions as she cooked. We got to try all the dishes, served with brown rice, wholemeal tortillas and garnishes as appropriate. The final dish was a Bakewell tart with plant-based cream, which Lucy had prepared earlier. Everything tasted delicious and we all felt replete by the end of the evening.



Judging by comments during the evening, I am hopeful that most of us will be trying at least one or two of Lucy's recipes in the future. Lucy was given two rounds of applause and many words of thanks for putting on this most enjoyable event. JF

Lent Pilgrimage for Climate

During Lent, the Bishop of Kingston led six pilgrimages across the Diocese of Southwark. I went along on the first one, which went through the deaneries of Reigate and Tandridge. We were welcomed at The Yard by Reigate railway station for a briefing and a short service before setting off through a very affluent part of Reigate to the Pilgrim's Way along the North Downs.




We stopped at several spots along the way to reflect on the various environmental issues that concerned us, such as roads and houses, Gatwick airport, fossil fuel extraction, noise and air pollution, farming and water.

We were welcomed at St Andrew's Gatton, St Katharine's Merstham (where we were provided with a choice of delicious soups to complement the packed lunches we had brought, and the Bishop planted a tree) and St Peter and St Paul's Chaldon. We sang a lament, prayed and spent time in reflection on our journeys and what changes we might make in our future.

We chatted to each other about our own experiences and feelings. Most people came from within our deaneries, but I did meet people from Bromley and Epsom amongst others. Low Carbon Energy

Over Spring this year, we have shared information on solar panels and heat pumps, to consider their possible use at Christ Church. We have asked for the congregation's views in a questionnaire, and had a good response, with a summary of responses here:



These show a strong level of support for installing solar panels, and included offers of help for fundraising, obtaining quotes and reviewing options. There was much less support for installing a heat pump and some concern over whether they would be effective, with a continuous low heat in dated radiators.

The results were presented to the PCC on the 16th May and we have agreed to proceed to obtain quotes for installation of a suitable level of solar panels.

Hedge-laying: A beneficial ancient skill

Hedge-laying is believed to have been started at least 1000 years ago in Britain as a means of providing a stock-proof barrier - long before the advent of more modern forms of stock fencing. Left to its own devices a newly planted 'hedge' will eventually become a line of trees with gaps through which farm animals can easily push their way through, but if the stems are cut and all prised over in the same direction (uphill) and 'pleached' (woven) together these can be filled. A hinge of sap-wood is left which is sufficient for the trees to continue growing, putting up new growth vertically, as well as new growth at the cut.



The hedge is firmed-up in a variety of regional styles. In Surrey, a line of stakes are driven mid -way through the hedge 18" apart and firmly held in place with hazel 'binders' which are artfully entwined. The stakes and binders will eventually rot away by which time the hedge should be quite thick and robust, and can be re-laid every 20 or so years.

Hedge-laying is undergoing something of a comeback, with volunteers taking up the work with simple tools as a Winter activity beneficial to wildlife providing great cover and a natural corridor for wildlife, irrespective of its visual appeal.
